

How to Maintain a Catheter

Step-by-step

Emptying the Bag


Supplies: container, alcohol swabs, and disposable gloves.

- Open the clamp at the bottom of the bag over a container.
- Let the urine drain until bag is empty.
- Clean the clamp off with an alcohol swab.
- Reseal the clamp.
- Clean the clamp off with an alcohol swab.


Cleaning the catheter tube

Supplies: disposable gloves, soapy & clean water, washcloths and towels, gauze, and a waterproof pad.


- First, empty the bag to prevent pulling.
- Start by asking for permission to wash the person's genitals.
- Hold the catheter tube as close to their body as possible.
- Use a clean, soapy cloth and gently wipe down the tubing. (Repeat as needed).
- For a suprapubic catheter, if the site is fulling healed, you can wash around the tube with soap and water, starting at the tube and cleaning outward in a circular motion.
- A piece of gauze may be placed around the suprapubic tubing for comfort.



Catheter care is a very personal experience and needs to be done in a sensitive and respectful way.



"Suprapubic" catheters also stay in all the time and have a bag, but the tube is placed in the lower stomach area with surgery.



"Indwelling" catheters are the type most people think about. The tube goes through the urethra so urine can drain into a bag.

Changing the bag

Supplies: a clean drainage bag, gloves, alcohol wipes, a container, and a waterproof pad or towel.

- Empty the bag.
- Place a towel/waterproof pad under the connection between the catheter tubing and the bag tubing.
- Pinch, or clamp the catheter tubing.
- Carefully disconnect the catheter from the old bag.
- Wipe the catheter tube with an alcohol wipe and connect the new bag.
- Discard the old bag if a replacement bag is available, if not, you can set aside the bag for cleaning.
